Looking for familiar FirstSearch databases? Find them now in WilsonWeb!

If you are a returning student or faculty member, you may have noticed a change in some databases we formerly subscribed to through OCLC FirstSearch. Beginning this fall, many of those FirstSearch databases are now offered through a new platform, WilsonWeb.

Some added features available through WilsonWeb:

- More full-text content than before (2,900 full-text publications). Familiar abstract databases such as Readers' Guide Abstracts and Art Abstracts, are now full-text.
- Databases are now updated daily.
- Text-to-speech feature offering audio versions of HTML full-text articles, which can be downloaded and saved to a mobile device!
- Translation of HTML full-text articles into any of 12 languages.
- Automatically formats citations in MLA, APA, etc.

If you were used to searching WilsonSelect Plus, it's now called OmniFile Full Text Select on WilsonWeb. It's still all full-text and interdisciplinary (covering areas such as art, education, science, social sciences, and the humanities), and many of the articles are peer-reviewed.

How does Full-Text @ Hekman work?

Search our research databases and you will often come across this icon next to item citations:



The Full-Text @ Hekman service works by checking the Hekman Library holdings to determine if we have local access, either print or online. By clicking on that icon, you will be presented with full-text options for the item; if we do not have print or online access for it, there will be a link for requesting it through interlibrary loan (ILL).

Bottom line? Anytime you see the Full-Text @ Hekman icon in the research databases, click on it to check your access options.
